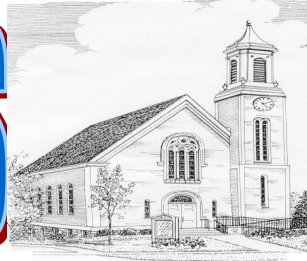

Kids Capes of Courage

This ministry was created by the women of Northampton United Methodist Church in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio. Their mission is meant to brighten the lives of children and provide encouragement and joy during a difficult time. They do this by providing capes to children who are hospitalized, in medical treatment, in foster care homes, or receiving services from agencies serving children.

Dress A Girl Around the World

Hope 4 Women International began this program in October 2009 and since then has distributed more than 450,000 dresses to 82 countries! By giving a girl a new dress her destiny could be changed forever. A new dress gives a girl an appearance of being cared for and may discourage would-be predators. A Dress a Girl label is sewed on the outside of each dress sending the message that this girl is under the care of an organization and gives her added protection from those who might want to harm her.

Please join us on this evening to learn more about these missions, to cut fabric, assemble kits, sew, iron, and enjoy fellowship together. May the grace of God touch you to do God's work with your hands as we provide capes and dresses to those in need.

Celebrating 298 Years!

In the spring of 1710, some 12 families met to consider building a meeting house on the east side of the Connecticut River. This was the beginning of the Third Society of Middletown; later known as

Chatham, and finally, Portland. Four years later, the General Assembly in Hartford granted permission for this group to "become a society of themselves," and a site for their meeting house was chosen (present junction of William and High Street where you will find a small brownstone monument marking the spot). There were 18 men who posted bond to fund the building of the meeting house, and in the autumn of 1720, they voted to call their first minister. On **October 25, 1721**, the Reverend Daniel Newell was ordained. Our church was formed!

In celebration of our 298th anniversary year we will be displaying our 275th Anniversary Quilt in Fellowship Hall for all to enjoy. This signature quilt made in 1996 was lovingly made with the help of 110 families of our church. Each person contributed a square using their own meaningful fabric with a universal pattern. The pattern that was used was inspired by a quilt made by Betsey M. Wright Lee in the 1800's entitled "Betsey! I wish you a Merry Christmas." Each square is signed and contains a meaningful message from its contributor. This quilt is a precious keepsake and stands as a lasting remembrance of that special year.

Dear Friends,

At baptisms, we have all heard this question asked of parents. "By what name will this child be known?" Names ... we all have one. Some are passed down from generation to generation, some are unique, some are familiar but each name is significant for many reasons. A name is the most important means by which someone identifies and refers to you. Our names appear on legal documents from the beginning to the end of life ... birth certificates, baptismal certificates, social security cards, drivers' license, marriage license, death certificates. It is said that there is no sweeter sound than to be called by your name.

I once learned a valuable lesson from a volunteer I worked with at Middlesex Hospital ... he was a hard-working man with a most generous spirit of service. He was a refugee and his name was unfamiliar to us. As was our practice, we ordered a hospital name badge for him and placed it on the name badge board. When he arrived for his first day of volunteering, he took the badge off the board, and came to desk and said "My name is spelled wrong on this tag." We apologized and told him we would reorder the badge and have a new one for him the following week. The new badge arrived and was placed it on the name badge board. When he arrived, he again took the badge down and brought it to the desk. The first name had been corrected, but his last name was spelled incorrectly. We were embarrassed and again apologized to this most gracious man. The following week when he arrived to volunteer, he took his badge off the board and thanked us. He then said something that I have never forgotten, "Thank you for having my name badge fixed. When I left Cuba to come to America, the only thing I could bring with me was my name and that is why it is so important to me." I have never forgotten this humble gracious man and his story.

When you attend worship on Sunday mornings, you will find that we are returning to the practice of wearing nametags. As our church family grows, we want guests and new members to feel welcome. Greeting one another by name is one way we can extend the hand of fellowship to fellow church members and guests. Please check your nametag carefully to be certain your name is spelled correctly and that we have used the name you wish to be called.

I look forward to seeing you as we get into the fall swing of church activities.

Dear Friends,

I read an essay by Pico Iyer titled, “The Beauty of the Ordinary.” In part, it touches on the lessons we gain from the autumn season. He writes “... *people relish autumn days precisely because they’re reminders of how much we cannot afford to take for granted, and how much there is to celebrate right now, this shining late September afternoon.*”

Coincidentally, I am writing this letter on a “shining late September afternoon.” I am visiting at a nursing home – gazing out the open window and taking in the beauty of the ordinary: grass, trees, roses, birds in flight, and the effects of a gentle breeze.

Specifically, I am sitting by my mother-in-law’s bedside as she lays dying. I happen to be alone with her right now, but family and friends and nursing home staff have been here with their comforting presence, skilled hands, loving words, and heartfelt prayers.

As the fall days cool and shorten, and the leaves turn color and drop from the trees, these changes remind us to celebrate what we have right now. Celebrate life. Celebrate love. Things come to an end. Lives come to an end. But as Pico Iyer reminds us, we can be grateful.

Alice’s long life – 99 years! – is about to come to an end. The ultimate change is upon her as she passes from this world to the next. We give thanks on “this shining late September afternoon” for a woman who has devoted herself to her family, her faith, and her friends. Moreover, she loved New England with its changing seasons and its beautiful countryside, mountains, woods, lakes, rivers, and ocean waters.

Things come to an end. Lives come to an end. But one’s legacy lives on. Beauty lives on. In the ordinary, we find the extraordinary. Together let us give thanks for nature, for people precious to us, and for the extraordinary grace and goodness of God.

The Board of Missions
