A message from REV. JANE HAWKEN, PASTOR

Many thanks to the congregation for the gift of sabbatical time and to the church leaders, Deacons, and staff for all their work this summer in maintaining – and Dear Friends, furthering – our ministry. A special thank you to the Rev. Eva Cudmore for her pastoral presence and her inspiring, faith-filled worship services and sermons.

I'm writing this letter in mid-August. If all goes as planned, I will be heading soon to Florida to spend two weeks with my mother. I will be accompanied by our daughter Emily and granddaughter Alice who will visit for a few days in Florida as we all enjoy a four-generation gathering.

While I am excited about this pending trip, I know that plans can change abruptly. If the pandemic has taught us nothing else, we have learned – the hard way - that life does not always go as predicted.

But of course, we have learned this lesson before. Twenty years ago on September 11, the shocking, deadly attacks changed our lives, perceptions, and our world in unexpected and unprecedented ways. In the midst of grief, fear, and anger, we found ways to cope. And we held in prayer those who lost so much, and those who faced danger and deprivation as subsequent wars raged on.

Even normal disturbances such as accidents, weather calamities, health problems, financial hardships, and relationship struggles bring disruption to life as we know it and to the future we imagine for ourselves.

Robert Burns, the great, 18th century Scottish writer, penned a memorable line in his poem "To a Mouse." He wrote 236 years ago: "The best-laid schemes o' mice an' men / Gang aft agley." The language might be a bit unfamiliar, but the meaning holds true: our best-laid plans often go astray.

Burns's line came to me as I was thinking about our intended "schemes" at the church in the upcoming months. We have wonderful plans for worship services, events, fellowship opportunities, mission, church school, confirmation, the Nursery School and recognition of its staff, and the 300th Anniversary celebration. We know that COVID precautions and concerns might impact and alter some of our plans, but we will find ways to continue on in a spirit of hope and faith.

We are taught in the New Testament Letter to the Hebrews, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever." Hebrews 13:8 This is a helpful verse to bear in mind as we contend with making changes, alterations, and modifications.

As we head into the future, where our best-laid plans might go astray, may the steadfast love and constancy of Christ – the One who is the same yesterday, and today, and forever – grant us the power, resilience, and fortitude to faithfully face the future as it unfolds.



Celebration Sunday: September 12

Church school begins on September 12. The Opening Ceremony theme will be "A New Start" and students will receive in the mail a cut-out of a rainbow with instructions. Any child who does not receive a rainbow may pick one up at the church office or contact Mrs. Labby. Students are asked to bring their rainbow to the worship service on Celebration Sunday. The Children's Message will focus on the story of Noah's Ark, and children are reminded to bring their FAVORITE stuffed animal and their rainbow, which will be featured as part of the Children's Message.

Church School Plans for Fall

Church School will be offered in-person on Sunday mornings in Fellowship Hall. Just as in school, masks will be required. Children who wish to participate remotely may do so by joining in via Zoom for online live participation. REGISTRATION forms are required each year, and help us know how much curriculum to order. Registration forms may be found on the church website and should be returned to the church as soon as possible. ADULT and HIGH SCHOOL AGE VOLUNTEERS are needed to help with the class once a month.

The Church School UNICEF Carnival will be held on Sunday, October 31 during Church School. Following the Worship Service, baked potatoes with all the fixings will be available for \$5 each, including a drink. TO GO potatoes will be available. Funds raised through the Baked Potato Luncheon will be donated to a Mission Project chosen by the church school students.
